Canada's Prompt Payment Act

Canada's Prompt Payment Act, introduced in 2019, aims to address the issue of delayed payments in the construction industry. Under this legislation, contractors and subcontractors involved in construction projects have the right to receive timely payments for their work. The Act sets out specific timelines for payment, including the requirement for owners to pay contractors within 28 days and for contractors to pay their sub-contractors within seven days of receiving payment.
